- The caretaker is managing it well and keeping the main grass area in good condition
- The foundation phase of the upgrade is 2/3 of the way completed
- Utilization of the facility is growing and bookings for the future season is strong
- Health and Safety is a big undertaking for them at the moment
- There are plans in place to install a new transformer system and sites along the campgrounds are being upgraded
- \$1.6m has been raised in grants for the centre
- The caretaker is slowly resting the grass to ensure it is in good condition for jumping competitions

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11. Area Delegate Job Description

Minor edits were applied to bring the document up to date. Edits as follows:

Area Delegates are responsible for:

- All delegates must be members of ESNZ. Delegates are the communication voice between the National Discipline and Area Members
- Reporting to their area committee on matters happening nationally, including rule-changes, registration requirements and any other matters pertaining to show jumping.
- Putting forward remits from area to the ESNZSJ conference
- > Representing their area's vote at Annual AGM on remits and any other matters requiring a vote
- Supplying a calendar of all affiliated events within their area, to the sports manager of show jumping
- Representing ESNZSJ, promoting National Series sponsors at shows. All corflutes and banners must be displayed in the correct manner at all shows in their area.
- Must be associated with the running of at least one show in the area they represent
- Encourage area to have a designated Publicity Officer. Where possible promote your local events to the media. By liaising with their area publicity officer and supplying results to the Show jumping ESNZ Jumping official publicity officer. (This role should not fall to the show secretary) Diana Dobson North Island; Annie Studholme South Island.
- Promote membership to ESNZ in local area. Recruiting of new officials, judges and course designers. New and Upgrading of Officials must go to ESNZSI ESNZ Jumping board for approval via Sport Manager.Jumping Director.

Area Delegates will be reimbursed their airfare up to a maximum set by ESNZSJ for their attendance at the Annual Conference and AGM. GST invoice or air tickets are to be sent to the Show jumping NZ Sport Manager, prior to the conference.

12.Remits

REMIT 1

Remit to reinstate a rule allowing riders to compete using a paid Day Rider membership

New Rule:

There is no current Rule for Day Rider Membership but it used to be in the: Show Hunter Rules 2013, this was removed from the rules under the change of Rider Membership June 2014 by ESNZ.

Show Hunter Rule 2013:

A Horse and/or Rider may start in the Low Hunter Division with a paid Day Registration.

Proposed Rule:

To allow riders to compete using a paid Day Rider Membership of \$10.00 per day to compete in Jumping and Show Hunter Classes.

To allow Horses and Ponies to compete using a paid Day Equine Membership of \$10.00 per day to compete in Jumping and Show Hunter Classes.

Excluding all Jumping and Show Hunter Series Classes, NZ Nationals, Island Championships and the Horse of the Year competition.

That all Horses and Ponies need to have a full ESNZ Registration and a Current Annual Jumping/Show Hunter Start to compete at the following heights for Jumping Classes:

Horses 1.10m and above

Ponies 1.05m and above

Rationale:

There are many riders who wish to compete but due to work and family commitments are unable to make it to many shows. However they still want to be competitive, e.g. jump higher heights and win Prize Money.

This would allow them to compete in classes higher than the 80cm introductory classes, which is all they can compete in under current Community Membership.

In the past there has been a Day Rider Membership and it worked perfectly well.

There has been an obvious decrease in the Riders/Horses competing in Low Hunter, since the removal of the Day Rider Registration.

The previous Graded Day Rider Membership was \$20.00 per event, and the Day Membership was \$5.00 per day.

We are looking to increase this to \$10.00 per day.

Motion that as the remit stands, this goes forward to ESNZ board if in favour as proposed rule change. Discussion, non-binding vote for board to take to ESNZ

Footnote: Jumping would need to take this remit through to ESNZ Central as it relates to membership. Members can presently jump up to 80cm on a Community Membership + \$5 levy to discipline. This would affect all disciplines.

Gisborne moved that the wording be changed to "Heights go to 1.20 horses and 1.10 for ponies (whatever is on flexi start) Fee: from \$10 to \$20" **Moved:** Gisborne **Seconded:** Bay of Plenty

REMIT 2

Jumping By-Law –10.1 Election of Board Members – Nomination of Candidates Nomination of Candidates

Current Rule:

10.1 – Nomination of Candidates

Not less than twenty eight (28) day prior to the AGM, any Jumping Area Committee seeking to nominate a member of ESNZ Jumping to fill any position provided for in Rule 9.1(a) shall forward such nomination to the ESNZ Jumping Director in writing, in the form prescribed by the Board together with a supporting Curriculum Vitae.

If a nominated Board Member is a retiring Board Member then a supporting Curriculum Vitae is deemed not to be required.

Proposed Rule:

Not less than twenty eight (28) days prior to the AGM, a notice of intention in writing by any Jumping Area Committee or a Current Financial Member of ESNZ to nominate a person for the Jumping Board (together with particulars of qualifications and experience) must be received by the ESNZ Jumping Director at least five weeks prior to the meeting. The intended Nominee must consent to the nomination in writing.

If a nominated Board Member is a retiring Board Member then a supporting Curriculum Vitae is deemed not to be required.

Rationale:

The Gisborne Area feels that this way of nominating a person for a position on the Show Hunter Executive works perfectly well and should be adopted as the way to nominate a person to stand for the Jumping board.

<u>Remit 3</u> Jumping By-Laws, Annual General Meeting – Nature and Purpose

Current Rule:

There is no current rule in the Jumping section of the By-Laws 2014 as to how an Area or an individual member can put a remit forward to the Jumping AGM.

Proposed Rule Change:

Add the following wording into:
6. Annual General Meeting. 6.1 AGM – Nature and Purpose:
(f) Accepting and considering Remits affecting Jumping Rules and Jumping Series Conditions from individual members and Areas.

Rationale:

In the By-Laws that were updated in 2014, it is not clear as to how an Area or member can put forward a Remit to the Annual Jumping Conference. It is in the Show Hunter section of the By-Laws and we feel that similar wording would be rectifying this situation.

Proposed: Gisborne Seconded: Bay of Plenty

Footnote: Technical Committee supported this remit which has been passed under the bylaw changes.

<u>Remit 4</u> Article 245 – General

Current Rule:

To allow Prize Money to be awarded for Introductory Classes at a Shows discretion. Horse/Pony not registered for ESNZ Jumping / Show Hunter Introductory classes 80cm and under with no prize money \$5.00 for the show

Proposed Rule:

Horse/Pony not registered for ESNZ Jumping / Show Hunter Introductory classes 80cm and under with prize money set at a Show Organising Committee's discretion. \$5.00 for the show

Rationale:

We feel that it is now time to review Prize Money for Introductory Classes.

If a show is able to offer some level of prize money, it will encourage riders to come along to an event and have a go.

If they have success there is a very good chance that they will then go on and register themselves and their pony.

Proposed: Gisborne **Seconded:** Central and Southern HB

Footnote: Technical Committee would not be happy to see prize money being paid for intro classes as this will become a membership issue meaning registration would apply instead of the current rule of allowing Community Membership in this area.

Non-binding vote - motion for remit to be put forward to the ESNZ Board for discussions:

<u>Remit 5</u> Annex 11 – Jumping Series Conditions - Junior Rider Series Conditions, Qualifications

Current Rule:

No Rule

Proposed Rule Change:

Competitors may not have won prize money in a Registered Jumping Class 1.35m and above during current season.

Excluding special classes i.e. Two Fence Challenge, Six bar, Gamblers Stakes and Age Classes.

Rationale:

The Gisborne Area feels that as this is a Rider class it should run under the same series conditions as the Amateur and Pro Am.

Footnote: If this remit was to go through it would restrict entry for these competitions

<u>Remit 6</u> Article 256 – Dress and Salute

Current Rule:

1. Dress

1.5. Formal Standard of dress: Light coloured Breeches or Jodhpurs of one colour; Brown or Black jodhpur boots, Gaiters (short leggings /chapettes) or riding boots must be worn. Shirts must have a collar and sleeves (short or long) and be predominantly one colour. A choker, stock or tie, and riding jacket must be worn. With the approval of the Organising Committee riders may either wear a windbreaker or rain coat in adverse weather conditions, or in very warm weather be allowed to ride without jackets.

Proposed Rule Change:

1.Dress

1.5. Formal Standard of dress: Light coloured Breeches or Jodhpurs of one colour; Brown or Black jodhpur boots, Gaiters (short leggings /chapettes) or riding boots must be worn. Shirts must have a collar and sleeves (short or long) and be predominantly one colour. A choker, stock or tie, and riding jacket must be worn.

(Articles 1.6 & 1.7 remain the same)

1.8 Weather extremes, riders may either wear a windbreaker or rain coat in adverse weather conditions. In very warm weather 25°C and over, riders be allowed to ride without jackets with the exception of Series Classes and Ring one competition.

Rationale:

When it is pouring with rain no one asks the organising committee if they can ride in a rain coat, common sense simply prevails. Conversely when it is really hot the same common sense rule is not evident, this remit serves to remedy this situation. In Australia the US and many other countries riders in hot temperatures are not required to wear jackets. To monitor heat current temperatures are readily available on smart phones.

Footnote: Technical Committee feels there are already dress rules in place for this remit

<u>Remit 7</u> Remit for new rule – Rear (hind) boots in Series Age Classes

Current Rule:

No current rule.

Proposed Rule

Rear (hind) boots in Series Age Classes:

- For all Horse Age Series competitions (four, five, six, and seven): All hind leg protections must have a maximum interior length of 16 centimetres, the width of the fastener must be at least five centimetres.
- The inside of the protection must be smooth. Only non-elastic velcro-type fasteners are permitted, no hooks, buckles, clips or other methods of attaching the fasteners may be used;
- The rounded rigid part of the protection must be placed around the inside of the fetlock;
- No additional elements may be used in conjunction with the protection.
- Hind boots that have an extra flap for protection should be allowed providing the flap is soft and is clearly intended for protection only.
- Sheepskin linings are allowed.

Rationale:

Internationally these rules have been introduced for all Young Horse Age classes.

The welfare of our young horses that are competing in the Age series is paramount. Our sport is now seeing rear hind action boots being used on some horses inappropriately without any thought to the future of the horse in our sport.

This can also give a false indication of the horses' ability to bascule correctly over a jump.

Footnote: Technical Committee makes the suggestion that for age group classes the 2016 Young Horse Show this proposed rule be compulsory and recommends that for the 2016/2017 season this proposed rule is trialed for any 4, 5, 6 and 7 Age Series Classes with a view of putting this rule into the rule book for the 2017/2018 season.

<u>Remit 8</u> Article 285 – Classification of Horses & Ponies

Current Rule:

Classification of Horses and Ponies

5. Exceptions may be novelty classes and Show Hunter training classes.

Proposed Rule Change:

Classification of Horses and Ponies

5. Exceptions may be novelty classes, Jumping training events and Show Hunter training classes.

Rationale:

Remit seeks to add the words "jumping training events" thus allowing an adult rider to ride a pony at Jumping Training events.

1. Adult riders aged 17 years and older may ride ponies at Training events and will not be eligible for prizes.

2. Dressage, Eventing, Show Hunter and Showing allow adults to ride ponies under certain circumstances.

3. Adults can correctly school and train ponies producing confident and capable ponies.

4. At present adults ride ponies in hack ring which means they are jumping hack distances which does not build confidence in young ponies.

In preparing this remit I found conflicting terms being used in the rules Training classes, SH training days and SH Introductory events. General Regulations are no help. Definitions are unclear.

Footnote: Technical Committee does not support adults riding ponies at any ESNZ Jumping events or competitions.

<u>Remit 9</u> Annex 11 - Jumping Series Conditions – New Zealand University Jumping Championship Series Conditions

Current Rule:

4.5. The series will normally run during the main university summer vacation period (mid-November to end of February), although subject to ESNZ Jumping Board approval, the series competition may also occur outside this period as part of HOY and for the Grand Final.

Proposed Rule Change:

The series will run as per the ESNZ Jumping calendar from 1st August to the series grand final at the end of the calendared season.

Rationale:

To enable any university student to compete in this series over a full calendar season rather than limit to only the summer vacation period. As this competition is run in conjunction with either an open 1.20m or a 1.30m competition this change would not hinder a shows ability to run this series.

Footnote: Technical Committee suggests that this remit may create an un-level playing field for this Series if it is run outside of University Season.

<u>Remit 10</u> Annex 11 – Jumping Series Conditions – General Conditions, Principles

Current Rule:

Principles

2.9. Riders gaining first round faults of 12 or more do not gain points in ANY Series. At the National Champs this applies B and D rounds.

Proposed Rule Change:

Riders gaining first round faults of 12 or more do not gain points or receive prizemoney in ANY Series. At National Champs this applies B and D rounds.

Rationale:

For shows running competitions with less than six starters in a series class, money is being paid out to horses and riders that are having 12 faults or more making the cost of running these classes expensive for the show to run.

Horses or riders gaining 12 or more faults in the first round of Series competitions do not get any Series points for these rounds so should not collect prizemoney as well.

Riders at some shows may late enter some Series classes when they see there are small numbers purely knowing they will receive large amounts of prizemoney as all prizemoney for the said series needs to be paid out.

Footnote: Technical Committee suggests the rules around the Series work well with the points to prizemoney levels. It is very much an OC's (would like to pay less prizemoney out) vs Riders (who travel to shows and want prizemoney regardless of their faults).

<u>Remit 11</u> Annex 11 – Jumping Series Conditions – General Conditions, Prizes

Current Rule:

Prizes 4.5. Prizes should be awarded in a ratio of 1:7 place getters to starters. With a minimum of 6 placings.

Proposed Rule Change:

Prizes should be awarded in a ratio of 1:7 place getters to starters, where the starters have gained less than 12 faults in the first round. A minimum of six placings would then be awarded.

Rationale:

For shows running competitions with less than six starters in a series class, money is being paid out to horses and riders that are having 12 faults or more making the cost of running these classes expensive for the show to run.

Horses or riders gaining 12 or more faults in the first round of series competitions do not get any series points for these rounds so should not collect prizemoney as well.

Riders at some shows may late enter some series classes when they see there are small numbers purely knowing they will receive large amounts of prizemoney as all prizemoney for the said series needs to be paid out.

Footnote: Technical Committee suggests the rules around the series work well with the points to prizemoney levels. It is very much an OC's (would like to pay less prizemoney out) vs Riders (who travel to shows and want prizemoney regardless of their faults).

<u>Remit 12</u> Annex 11 – Jumping Series Conditions – General Conditions, Prizes

Current Rule:

4.1. Prizes in cash or kind, must be paid out down to sixth place (minimum) with the winning horse or competitor not receiving more than one third of the total prize money offered in cash or kind (excluding competitions under Article 238.1.1).

Proposed Rule Change:

Prizes in cash or kind, must be paid down to sixth place (minimum) to horses or riders that gain under 12 faults in the first round of any Series, with the winning horse or competitor not receiving more than one third of the total prize money offered in cash or kind (excluding competitions under Article 238.1.1).

Rationale:

For shows running competitions with less than six starters in a series class, money is being paid out to horses and riders that are having 12 faults or more making the cost of running these classes expensive for the show to run.

Horses or riders gaining 12 more faults in the first round of series competitions do not get any series points for these rounds so should not collect prizemoney as well.

Some riders late enter series classes when they see there are small numbers purely knowing they will receive large amounts of prizemoney as all prizemoney for the said series needs to be paid out.

Footnote: Technical Committee suggests the rules around the Series work well with the points to prizemoney levels. It is very much an OC's (would like to pay less prizemoney out) vs Riders (who travel to shows and want prizemoney regardless of their faults).

Annex 11 – Jumping Series Conditions – General Conditions, Prizes

Current Rule:

4.5 Prizes should be awarded in a ratio of 1:7 place getters to starters. With a minimum of 6 placings.

Proposed Rule Change:

If the pool of entry fees received for a series class is insufficient to cover the required prize money as set out in the series class rules, the total entry fee pool will be divided up between the six place getters as prize money. Horses that score 12 faults or more in the first round will not be eligible for any prize money.

Shows will only be required to advertise the minimum total prize pool in their schedule, not how it will be divided. This total prize pool would only be adjusted as above if the entry fees do not cover the required minimum prize money. Events can offer prize money over and above the prize money required, but are liable for the amount if advertised.

Rationale:

- Currently series classes are costing shows a lot of money to run with most of them not covering the prize money required to be paid out. If the total entry fees received for the class were divided then at least the classes would not run at such a loss as they do now. This will enable shows to lift the standard of their shows in other ways and promoting the sport in a better way, rather than having to find prize money for the few entering the class.
- Note that series classes simply do not get the numbers to ever be applying a 1:7 ratio pay out and the six placing requirement is draining show resources and cannot continue to be sustained over a long term period.
- Points for series classes are the reward for those who travel long distances, and when surveying local riders about prize money we found the majority was not concerned about the amount of prize money being offered as it is won by the minority on most occasions. Introducing this would enable shows that are currently not offering a full set of series classes, due to monetary constraints, to do so.
- The sport should be looking at ways of reducing these compulsory costs of running series classes whilst this may not be the total answer to everyone's problems it is worth considering. Bear in mind if there are other ideas that could improve this that it can be amended.
