9: Approval of ride calendar

- Change to East Coast from 17/18th to 10/11th August due to lambing.
- Change to Waikato Thornton Beach from 24 August to 31 August/1st September due to tides
- Change to Marlborough Oct 13 and Dec 1 Sunday only rides to include Saturday as well.

The calendaring of two FEI rides 1 week apart in December was queried as would limit availability of officials and limit possibility of entries travelling from the other island. The board thought if sufficient to run both then it was in the riders' interests to do so.

The North Island FEI ride was approved first, and the South Island FEI ride was then given the go ahead by the board after a rider driven decision at a public meeting with the support of the East Coast Club, and the understanding that the North Island event had already booked its officials. Some officials have booked to do both. The South Island riders involved had wanted an FEI event prior to the South Island championships and were unwilling to travel to the North Island for a non-championship event at that time of year.

The North Island Ride may have considered moving their date to November if it had been communicated earlier that a South Island ride was also planned for December. Going forward Calendar dates from clubs will be asked for earlier in the season so Calendar planning can be communicated and be adjusted to be more evenly spread so number of events can be sustainable going forward.

The point was also raised that there is still room in the Calendar for an FEI ride in March. And that such a ride would potentially encourage Australian entry participation for that and at Nationals the following month with sufficient spacing for the stand-down periods. Other factors to consider were club interest in running such an event, timing for farmland which affects track availability. Availability of Clayton Station was raised but thought to be too late in the piece to add in at this stage.

The choice of qualifying for National Championships or following the FEI pathway are 2 different priorities. Riders may need to choose between the two as to which is more important to them.

Marlborough was asked if they would consider running an Endurance 80km at their early January ride. They did not think possible with difficulty obtaining vets (no vets required at their standard rides), in addition to already being committed to the planning to hold Nationals this season.

Technical Committee (TC) Report 2024 -2025

Firstly, I would like to thank Louise Holmes, Ashley Cole and Jorja James for their time and commitment on the Endurance TC this season with me. Having four members again this season really helped to share the load and answer queries in a timely fashion.

Thanks also to all club committees and OCs, officials, volunteers, landowners, competitors and the ESNZ Endurance board for another successful Endurance and CTR season and for your involvement in our sport.

Schedules

Thanks to the TC for getting these done this season and thanks to the clubs for sending them in (mostly on time). Thanks also to Rena for her work in checking Officials' status.

Season Activities

- The **Technical Committee** has not had to make any **major decisions** this season.
- However, there have been requests for ride schedule changes, primarily due to instances where Officials did not hold the necessary qualifications for their assigned roles.

Attendance at ESNZ Technical Committee Meeting

- Rena and I attended the ESNZ Technical Committee meeting in May, where several ESNZ General Regulation (GR) changes were approved.
- These amendments will have minimal impact on endurance, but they contribute to the overall regulatory structure of the sport.
- These changes take affect from 1 August 2025 but will be published and promoted asap.

Rule Alignment Efforts & Challenges

- I personally proposed rule changes to better align national endurance regulations with FEI standards.
- Unfortunately, the ESNZ Endurance Board rejected these proposals, despite their strong foundation in transparency and equine welfare.
- This is a missed opportunity to strengthen fairness, consistency, and welfare protections for athletes and horses alike.

Ride Calendar Development

A special thank you to Louise for her dedication and hard work in assembling the ride
calendars, which ensures structured planning for riders and organisers. There were only
a couple of tweaks still needed as I wrote this report.

Acknowledgments & Committee Contributions

I would like to start by **thanking Wendy Farnell** for her **outstanding work** on this committee. We also appreciated the valuable input from **Sue Landis**, who unfortunately had to step down midseason due to other commitments. Her position was successfully filled by **Sue Billigheimer**, thank you both Sues.

National Officials Training & Course Development

This season saw **National Officials Training courses** delivered in both the **North and South Island**, thanks to Course Directors **Wendy Farnell and Ruth Dawber** for leading these. A special acknowledgment goes to **Wendy** for her **extensive efforts in re-writing the course content**, which received **positive feedback** from participants.

Additionally, several **National-level Officials** successfully upgraded their qualifications. Many have adopted the **ESNZ Officials Logbook** to record their event roles, an invaluable tool for streamlining **verification and tracking** of experience. I strongly **recommend all Endurance Officials** to make use of this system to **save time** and **improve efficiency**.

FEI Officials Training & Development

The **FEI Endurance department** continues to provide **online maintenance and transfer-up courses**, offering officials vital opportunities for progression. We extend our best wishes to **Sylvia Ireland** for her upcoming course and look forward to welcoming her back as a **Level 3 Steward for Endurance**— a role that will be highly beneficial to our sport.

Currently, at least three National-level Officials have begun or are considering starting their FEI pathway. We encourage others interested in this progression to connect with us so we can ensure they gain CEI event experience and receive appropriate guidance.

Personal Highlights & Reflections

A personal highlight for me this season was attending the **World Endurance Championships in Monpazier, France**, last September, where I had the privilege of officiating as a **Steward**. The event was **exceptionally well run** in a stunning location, with the French designing a **clever, strategic track** that ultimately led their team to victory. However, the competition was not without challenges—the start of the event coincided with a **storm**, bringing relentless rain throughout the morning. Despite the demanding conditions, it was a **rewarding experience** that showcased the resilience and skill of both horses and riders.

Other standout moments were my involvement in the **three ESNZ Endurance Championship Events** – hosted by Ruahine, Waitaki and Marlborough Clubs. These three Events, each unique in their own way, epitomised our sport and made me proud to be involved.

Endurance High Performance Annual Report 2024-2025

The High Performance Endurance pathway has been in place for a year now and at the time of reading this report it would have been through the final stage of having all squads selected.

We started the program off with selecting athletes to the High Performance Futures and High Performance Potential Squads in August 2024. This enabled us to invite the selected athletes to the High Performance Off Horse Camp which took place in Cambridge, which they all attended. At this camp all discipline squad athletes came together for two days of athlete development. The camp was an opportunity to induct new athletes with the main theme of the camp being on campaign planning, which for Endurance focused on the 2026 FEI Endurance World Championships, working through what was required and how things might happen. Full group sessions were held along with discipline specific break out discussions.

It was great to have the Endurance Athletes involved in this camp, and all the athletes in attendance enjoyed sharing experiences and learning of each other's disciplines.

No specific group squad trainings have been held over the last year but rather Individual connection with the HP Athletes has continued throughout the year establishing their individual performance plans and offering identified support. At this stage there has not been a lot of information come available regarding the World Championships but any that has, has been shared with the athletes.

The objective for the 2026 FEI Endurance World Championships is to aim for a team completion and the focus going forward will be to build on the capabilities to achieve this.

In December 2024, the next phase of the HP Endurance Pathway was launched, with applications opening for athletes to join both the Talent Identification (TID) Squad and the Talent Development (TD) Squad. The TID Squad has one application cycle per year, with a unified process across all disciplines. Since this was the first time athletes were being selected for the TD Squad, we decided to implement an application process to help determine which squad would be the best fit for each successful applicant.

Following the application process, athletes are then watched during the remainder of the season and then invited to attend a Combined Discipline Assessment Camp. This gave the opportunity for the athletes to be assessed against the values based criteria, along with athletes and parents learning more about the High Performance System and what they can expect if they were to be selected. Assessment days were held at the Christchurch and Taupo NEC's along with others being completed at the Endurance Nationals.

While the Endurance program has a zero budget, we feel we have been successful in establishing a framework that can now continue to be built on.

Technical Committee Nominations

The Technical Committee consists of a minimum of three (3) members as follows:

- One Board member appointed by the Board
- One member from the FEI Officials list elected by the members at the AGM
- One Ordinary member (must be Open or Graded as a rider) elected by the members at the AGM

As no nominations were received for the Technical Committee, nominations from the floor will be called for at the AGM.

The Board member for the Technical Committee will be appointed by the Board at their first Board meeting following the AGM.

Rule Changes

(i)

2.2 Classes of Competitions

Class Distances / Criteria

Intro 0-39(40) km, speed restriction of 13.5kph, not eligible for placings or Best Condition Awards Novice 40 - 90km, speed restriction of 13.5kph, not eligible for placings or Best Condition Awards Intermediate 40 - 79 km no speed restriction

Open 80-99 km no speed restriction

Alter Intro max km to 40km to allow newer riders the opportunity to try the distance with very few rides held between 20 &39km distance. Lifetime km would not be recorded.

(ii)

Rule 2.18: Suggestion "Whilst at the event base, all horses shall be under the control of the person responsible, or person identified/nominated by the person responsible, and must not be allowed to roam free.

This was not clear and could not be leant on when discussing with a rider that they really should allocate someone to take care of their second horse when they were 'absent' from base (for whatever reason).

(iii)

Rule 7.1 Classes at Championship Events

New Zealand National and Island Championship Events will include CEN and CEI Championship classes for Senior and Junior /Young Riders over the following distances:

- 140-160 km
- 120-139 km
- 100-119 km
- 60-79 km (CEN only)

CEI classes (standalone or combined with CEN) may also be held. Non-championship classes may be held at Championship events.

CEI Senior classes can be standalone or combined with CEN. CEN and CEI Junior classes will be separate. Non-championship classes may be held at Championship events.

The host club may submit a written request for only CEN classes to be held at a Championship event. The Board may approve this if it is deemed to not have a detrimental effect on the opportunities for competitors.

(iv)

Section Six Stand down periods

a) Horses that are ungraded: 0-39 km = no stand-down 40-54 km = 5 days

Horses that are graded Novice or Intermediate prior to entering a competition:

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0-79 km = no stand-down
80-90 km = 12 days
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Open Horses:

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0-(79)99 km = no stand down

100-119 (80-106) km = 12 days

120-139(106-126) km = 19 days

140-160 (126-146) km = 26 days

Over 146km = 33 days
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Thought was to align more closely with FEI standdowns. Opinions at forum were mixed with some thinking we should be closer as less confusing and others thinking that rider responsibility to be current with FEI standdown periods with no issues being found here.

(v)

2.11Novice Qualifying Procedure

a. Novice qualifying applies for horses and riders and consists of the successful completion of:

Two novice competitions of 40-60km (can include CTRs as long as a registered vet was used and speed is no faster than 13.5kph)

Followed by two novice competitions of 80-90km.

- b. Novice competitions shall be completed at a speed no faster than 13.5 kph
- c. Horses and riders must complete the requirements of novice qualifying within a 36-month period.
- d. After completing the novice qualification requirements, the following applies:

Horses – May compete in Open competitions up to a maximum distance of 90 km during the 12 month period from the date of their first qualified novice competition at a maximum speed of 16kph.

Riders - May compete in Open competitions up to a maximum distance of 90 km during the 6-month period from the date of their first qualified novice competition at a maximum speed of 16kph.

e. Time frame before being eligible to enter Open competitions of 100km

and over: Horses – 12 months after qualifying in their first novice competition. Riders – 6 months after qualifying in their first novice competition.

(vi)

2.7 Weights at CEN Competitions

a) Senior Open Classes: Minimum weight required is 70kg

- 65kg 80-99km
- 70kg ≥ 100km

Other Classes: No Minimum weight requirement

To encourage lighter weighted riders to move up to open.

(i)

2.10.7 Cross Crediting of Kilometres

- a) Kilometres earned at CTR competitions may be cross credited as novice rides to help fulfil requirements for:
 - Intermediate endurance eligibility total of 200km. (Refer to Endurance Rules 2.3b).
 - Novice Qualifying Procedure (Refer to Endurance Rules 2.11 & 3.3)
- b) To enable the two CTR competitions to be cross credited to endurance the following must apply:

The minimum distance for the CTR competitions must be 40km.

The horse must be a minimum of five years old at the time the competitions that are being cross credited were done.

The average speed is no more than 13.5km/hour.

Stand down rules as listed in endurance rules section 6 a) apply.

Reason

To not fall foul of FEI qualification criteria when claiming CTR rides as novice rides.

Rule changes to ratify

2.12 Teams Competition

Refer to supplementary rules 4.2.7

Admin to remove outdated rules

2.2.2.a Open Class:

: Before entering an Open CTR of 60km or longer the horse and rider (not necessarily as a combination) must first have qualified in a total of two rides from the following list, within the preceding 36 months.

- CTR competitions 40-59km
- Endurance competitions 40km or longer.
- DRNZ RTT 40km or longer
- DRNZ Enduro 40km or longer.

If the competition is a Championship class, one of the qualifying rides must be completed at an ESNZ event (refer to 2.11.2).

If the rider currently holds Intermediate or Open Rider status, the rider qualifying requirements have been met.
