PROFESSOR NATALIE WARAN



Professor Natalie (Nat) Waran BSc (Hons), PhD (Cantab)

Natalie (Nat) is an internationally recognised equine behaviour and welfare scientist. She was Professor of Animal Welfare, International Animal Welfare Centre Director, and International Dean at Edinburgh University's Veterinary School before she moved back to NZ in 2016 to take up the role of Professor of One Welfare and Executive Dean at EIT/Te Pūkenga.

Over the past 30+ years, she has researched and published across a range of areas including; horse transport, indicators of equine stress and pain, equine problem behaviour and equine quality of life and welfare assessment. She was a member of the UK research team considering the impact of heat and humidity on event horses, before the Atlanta 1996 Olympics and has provided independent expert welfare advice to a number of equine industries including the UK and HK Jockey Club. Her most recent research funded through the Hong Kong Jockey Club's new Welfare Foundation, and in collaboration with an international team is to develop methods for assessing positive emotion in horses. She has been a trustee for a number of international equine charities such as The Brooke and International Fund for Animal Welfare and worked closely with others such as World Horse Welfare.

A co-founder of the International Society for Equitation Science (ISES), she is now Honorary Fellow and Trustee for the organisation. In 2024 she will chair the local organising committee for the ISES conference to be held in NZ with the theme of 'A Good Life for all Horses'. She is also the Board Chair for Companion Animals New Zealand, the national organisation responsible for the NZ Animal Register – a microchip-based identification and traceability database for all companion animals (including horses) in NZ. As the invited chairperson of the new FEI Equine Ethics and Wellbeing Commission, she has just returned from Switzerland where she presented the FEI Sports Forum with a proposed new 'Good Life' Vision, Charter and 30 Recommendations to ensure equine welfare in sport is prioritised and to maintain equestrian sport's social licence.

When at home in Hawkes Bay, Nat enjoys coaching riders, as well as training and riding her own horses.

6.1: DRESSAGE NZ CHAIR

Scott McKenna

It has once again been an exciting and challenging year for Dressage.

Just when we thought that the days of big events and show calendars being up ended at short notice were behind us, we had yet another crisis to deal with in the form this time of a Cyclone. The way our community came together to support our members who were affected by the Cyclone was a real focal point of the year, highlighting so much compassion and generosity.

The work that was done to get Dressage events back up and running and to continue to offer a CDI 3* for our Paris hopefuls despite the cancellation of the Horse of the Year show was tremendous. A huge debt of gratitude must be expressed from me on behalf of the Dressage community to the Dressage Waikato organising committee (with a particular thanks to event manager Angela Nobilo) who accommodated the CDI at the Waikato Championships, moving mountains to make this happen.

This year has seen some exciting developments that promise to benefit all sectors of our sport. At the High Performance level we had the restructure of how our Performance Program is delivered. Our performance program is now managed by the High-Performance team which includes a dedicated high-performance manager for Dressage. Penny Pearce who was appointed to that role and despite finding her property underwater shortly after her appointment has hit the ground running. This restructure will ensure that we can provide our best riders with the support that they need to entrench New Zealand as a real player in international Dressage.

The move of the performance program to High Performance has permitted the Performance committee to evolve into the development committee focused on delivering development opportunities for all riders. This committee has been working hard and is well on track to deliver the Julie Brougham adult development camps in the both the North and South Island.

The Land Rover Dressage Teams League has been another exciting addition to the calendar this year. A league competition such as this puts a large amount of administrative burden on those who have to keep track of the scores over the season and a huge thanks must go to Jos Gresham who managed this points workload.

It has been exciting to see that we have been able to make progress in a way that has benefitted riders from the grass roots right through to our international performers.

There are of course many people to thank. Firstly, the team I get to work with on the Dressage Board. The dedication and hours of voluntary work these people put in is immense and is under appreciated. Particular appreciation must be expressed to Olivia Ballantyne and Alicia Cameron who are both stepping down form the Board this year. Both of these people juggled their board role with their own extensive personal commitments and that is a difficult and challenging thing to do. I am grateful that they were both willing to sacrifice their own time to do this and the sport has benefitted immensely from their time and effort.

I want to especially thank Judith Cunningham. Judith has had the strength of character to stand up for the values of ESNZ regardless of how difficult that was. Judith exemplifies the values and integrity that our sport needs. Without her support over the last twelve months I would not have been able to carry out my role as Chair.

I also need to acknowledge the work done by our finance officer Sarah Hazelwood. The workload her role involves has grown extensively over the last 12 months as a result of numerous factors. The work she does is far beyond what anyone could ever expect from a volunteer. It must be acknowledged that her personal sacrifice has directly benefited every dressage rider as it has significantly reduced the cost of administering our sport.

I also wish to thank the myriad of stakeholders who contribute to our sport and community and last but not least, our members and competitors.



Team World Championships 2022	It was an honour and highlight of the year to be appointed Chef dÉquipe for the Dressage World Championships team. the team was professional in their approach at all times, and I congratulate them all on their performances. Taking NZL to new heights on the world stage. Thank you to Jock Paget & Warrick Allan from ESNZ HP for their support.
Financial sustainability	Again we will see consistent and somewhat unexpected financial performance against budget with a very satisfactory result despite unbudgeted items (e.g., CDI at Waikato Champs to replace HOY Olympic Qualifier) that are an investment in our future, and the continuation of the ESNZ discipline service fee to support the central organisation sustainability (\$10K) The fragile & unknown outcome of grant applications for events means we do not include these in our annual budget so when received result in a better EOY outcome.
Volunteer / Officials Succession Planning & Development	Judges manual & pathway revision was completed and now phase 2 continues with new technology being investigated to map judges' activity. It has been suggested to ESNZ this could be discipline wide. A number of new judges recruited and upgraded. Thank you to the JSC (Judith Cunningham, Mary Caine & Mura Love) and Rachel McCallum our Steward General for their ongoing commitment to ensure we have the best group of well-trained officials possible adding value to our competitors experience
Communication to all stakeholders	Bulletin, Facebook pages(with some record reaches) x 6, website, Instagram, area newsletters at local level, Dropbox, emails A heartfelt thanks to Sarah Gray from Snaffle Design who produced 66 beautiful issues of the Bulletin and has now stepped down as the designer. We are currently looking at options going forward and look forward to discussing this at Committee
Development of Equine Athlete	A new Dressage HP programme is in place currently supported by Dressage @\$40k until 31/12/23. The HP vision is to secure external supporters to fund the programme as there is no Sport NZ Funding. The Development Cte has continued to be active
Increased number of Participants at all levels	The trends are changing across the levels as can be seen in the graphs – we look forward to the Road Show and the ESNZ Strengthen and Adapt project to learn more about what "equestrians" want from our organisation and the best means to add value for all competitors whilst still maintaining or increasing the quality of administration and events
Increased recognition of Dressage	If sponsorship support is an indicator, then Dressage is being increasingly recognised as a value-added investment by equestrian businesses and a sport which values all stakeholders. The outstanding results from our GP riders in Sydney (Melissa Galloway & Wendi Williamson) did much to increase the profile of our sport and now we must decide how to translate that success across the sport – especially at the lower levels
Improved competition facilities	Both NEC continue to strive for improvement with McLeans Island again undergoing substantial arena and stable facility upgrades this year Hopefully the intended upgrade of the Taupo grit surface arena is not too far away as the nationals 22/23 events were both under considerable timetabling pressure to provide enough warm up and competition surfaces of the quality expected by competitors -this situation is exacerbated with a CDI on the schedule – we do look forward to the new outdoor judges' boxes currently under construction – We must thank the retiring convenor of the Taupo NEC, Wallie Niederer for his longstanding vision and commitment to the centre.
Growth of sport Riders & volunteers	This aligns closely with increased numbers of participants has been a difficult year to measure. Areas are often seen to be calling for more volunteers close to events. The cost of fuel will not be assisting this cause in the coming season. Increased training & development opportunities at area level noted

It took some time to fill the position but we are really pleased to welcome Christine Latch to the role of Sponsorship Manager in early May.

The increased level of administrative time required this year particularly around events, has meant that time on strategic work, data analysis and matters such as website updates and Dropbox updates was less than optimal from my perspective. I have also spent many hours assisting the ESNZ database team around improving accuracy of the new HorseREG results. Looking towards the new season and the ESNZ Strengthen and Adapt project underway, there is still much to do.

The work done by Sarah Hazlewood as our volunteer finance administrator has been steadily increasing since she took on the role five years ago. Just as an example, over 600 transaction reconciliations are required for the National Championships alone. A special thanks to Sarah

I would like to also thank Scott McKenna for the four years he has undertaken the role of Chair, his work on the ESNZ Technical Committee and the ESNZ Constitution working party all have been invaluable. His legal knowledge and leadership have added much to the sport during his tenure and I hope he will stay connected with our sport even in an advisory capacity. Thank you Scott.

To Alicia Cameron and Olivia Ballantyne whose Board role terms have come to a completion, thank you for your contribution. It has been valuable to have a new generation of Board members who bring a new perspective to the table

To those Board members who will add a continuity to the team, Judith Cunningham, and Suzanne Inglis – thank you for your ongoing commitment.

New Tests & Test Books

It was agreed during the year that the USDF tests would be adopted for a further three-year cycle. Work on the new test book and test sheets is well underway for adoption 1/9/23

The Dressage NZ free to view online magazine, the DressageNZ Bulletin has ceased publication for a period as we review the magazine format. With Sarah Gray our fabulous designer I was editor of 66 beautiful issues. The magazine celebrated and informed and serviced our sponsors I look forward to ideas as to the format members would like to see continue these important functions of our sport. Thank you Sarah for your flair, and amazing design expertise (and your patience for late deadlines. There are so many interesting stories in our sport – how do we continue to tell them? A huge thank you to all the photographers and contributors who supported this not-for-profit publication.

The Dressage pages on the ESNZ website continue to attract good numbers with news linked to the Dressage NZ Facebook page. There are also Facebook pages for NI & SI riders, Coaches, the Bates National Championships, the Evo Events U25CH, the DressageNZ Bulletin and now Instagram is becoming more widely used.

Events

The Livamol FEI Dressage World Dressage was co-hosted Bates National Championships in November 22 at Taupo as being the most suitable NI date. What a thrill for NZL to second place in the global team competition. Congratulations

Debra Cowen, Cathy Vennell & Kara Lockhart were instrumental in ensuring the EvoEvents U25Ch and Youth Festival went ahead and it was a devastating decision to have to cancel the second day because of torrential overnight rain. when Covid impacted our resources.

The biggest thank you to David Jones-Parry and his Bates & Weatherbeeta teams for their huge support of this running two national championships in the same competition season – November 22 and March 23. This made the 25th anniversary show in March all the more special. Thank you also to Cassie Freeman who proved again to be a real asset as event manager for two more national championship events.

It was devastating for yet another Land Rover Horse of the Year cancellation, but that disappointment pales to insignificance compared with the many tragedies that unfolded from Cyclone Gabrielle. The Waikato Premier League moved to the March weekend and what a huge undertaking the Waikato committee accepted willingly when asked to incorporate a CDI3* and Paris OG 2024 qualifier. T

To Chris Paston and the Dressage NHB team, and Sophie Blake the Equestrian Manager from Horse of the Year Show – thank you for your ongoing commitment and we shared your dismay at another cancellation of the event. We all look forward to 2024.

A combined SI Island committee led by Anna Gale again took charge of the South Island Championships and it was a real pleasure to attend this well organised event.

Sponsorship

Despite the somewhat disrupted season, sponsorship levels were at an all-time high. When you view the wide range of national sponsors in this agenda, I believe we can be extraordinarily proud. Add in the support is secured for individual classes at events and that secured by areas, an estimate of \$250k total is realistic. annually by areas a considerable sum that effectively subsides the cost of participation for riders The policy of the Board is that all Dressage NZ events should aim for a neutral financial result and this was achieved in this financial year because of a strong event marketing programme and successful funding applications. There is a cost to securing sponsorship and delivering outcomes, but the benefits and opportunities need to outweigh this cost.

Para Equestrian

The Para Equestrian National Championships were again successfully integrated with the Bates Nationals in November 22 & March 2023.

ESNZ National

The discipline Sport Managers & ESNZ Central Team continue to have both online and in person meetings to share ideas and problem solve and provides a valuable resource.

Youth Council

Congratulations to the Youth Council who continue to bring much enthusiasm and a perspective that would otherwise not be observed at national level. Lucarne Dolley has retired as Chair owing to career commitments and in her place Meila Picard from Nelson who attended a national youth hui and has provided an excellent report for this conference. Thank you to the Council members for all you do to engage, encourage, and assist in the all-round participation and education of our next generation.

Also thank you to Suzanne Inglis for administering the **Dressage Judges Education FB page**— this is proving to be a good resource.

Thank you to Lesley Jacobson who continues to update our **National Register** of current Judges also including conflicts of interest for judges.

Thank you to Debra Cowan for setting up and administering the **Judges Google Form** for the past two years for our judges to record their points through the season for judging, clinics, and other tasks.

Also, a big thank you to all the regional Area Judges Officers who work to support and encourage their judges.

Judges Education and Clinics:

We have held successful clinics with visiting international judges **Ricky MacMillan** and **Isobel Wessels** at Taupo NEC. Thank you to all who helped with the organisation, especially Penny Pearce with the challenges she faced with cyclone Gabrielle, and to those judges, trainers and riders who attended.

We also held successful **National Clinics** in both islands last winter in 2022 with our educators, and we propose to hold national clinics again in areas in both islands in 2024. Our Educators are working on a format for those clinics- thank you for the time you put into preparing and presenting these clinics.

On-line Judge training through Black Horse One for our FEI and A and B level judges:

Thank you to Sue Hobson for her liaising with FEI IDOC Oceania region to facilitate the A and B Level judges on-line training seminars through Black Horse One. These seminars are a great learning experience for our national judges to practise judge European horses, with two 5-star FEI judges then providing discussion and feedback. This is a very exciting educational opportunity and we have more clinics coming up in the spring. **Judges Technical Training Manual:**

The JSC have completed the refresh and update of the Judges Technical Training Manual, we still plan to develop more interactive on-line forms and new website developments. Thank you to Fiora Au and Wendy Hamerton for their assistance with this process.

Judges Upgrading:

We are actively supporting areas with upgrading judges and facilitating upgrading opportunities, and Theory and Practical exams for candidates. We have had judges from many areas progressing with their pre-

requisites for upgrading supported by their AJO's and the JSC. I would like to congratulate judges who have upgraded and come onto the list during this last season.

Trans-Tasman Exchange:

It has been exciting to revive the Trans-Tasman Judges exchange for our A, B and C level judges, after being affected by Covid restrictions for the past few years. We have had six judges go to competitions in Victoria, New South Wales, and Queensland to date.

We have also hosted Australian judges from Victoria and Queensland at Premiere league shows here. We will continue to develop this exchange as it is of such benefit to our judges, and to our riders to have Australian judges coming to NZ.

New Tests:

We have the new USDF tests being introduced **on 1st September.** (The license for the current tests is expiring). These new tests were brought in by Australia in January this year.

After discussions and confirmation from stakeholders we are retaining our **NZ Medium level** tests, with some tweaks to improve rideability as this level is of benefit to our riders.

6.6 PERFORMANCE & DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE Andrea Raves (Interim Chair & Coach Rep)

Members of the Development Committee: Andrea Raves Chair and Coach Rep, Olivia Ballantyne Training and Rider Development Officer, Sarah Hazelwood Finance, Margs Carline Chair of Selectors, Debbie Barke Riders Rep, Penny Pearce Dressage HPD Manager, Georgia Bennett Administrator

It is exciting that Dressage has moved to a High Performance Pathway Program (HPPP) to deliver a targeted Program for our riders who strive towards representing NZ on the World stage. This is run by our High Performance Dressage Manager Penny Pearse (HPDM).

Being in a transition period, whilst appointing the HPD Manager and set up the HPPP, meant that the activities of the Performance and Development Committee (PDC) offered last season were limited to Zoom Sessions and the opportunity to attend Judges/Coaches and Riders Clinics.

The PDC felt that we should try to get Coaches / Riders and Judges working more together and we established a Coach Database in August 2022 so we know who to involve in upcoming discussions amongst the groups. The Database has now 185 members.

During the year we offered Zoom sessions, presented by Sarah Milne, Brett Parbery, our international Judges, and our Grand Prix Squad Riders, as well as the Clinics with Ricky McMillan and Isobel Wessels for Coaches of our Database and 2022/23 Squad members to attend. This was well received.

A South and North Island Yunior and Young Rider Camp was held in Christchurch and Taupo respectively. The Committee has produced a Template to run these camps with the help of former Convenors. We welcome the Young Rider Convenors for the 2023/24 season Georgia Bennett for the North Island and Naomi Murfitt for the South Island who have plans for the October 2023 Camps well in hand. Many Thanks to Pryde's for sponsoring these camps for another year.

We can confirm that we will have a North Island Adult Development Camp in Taupo on the 21-23 July and a South Island Camp in Christchurch on the 11-13 August. We have great interest in this new initiative. 30 riders in each Island will work on Arena Craft in their tests and have a series of lectures. The Camps will be known as the Julie Brougham Adult Development Camps. We do thank David Brougham for his generous donation.

The establishment of the HPPP means that from 1.6.2023 the Performance and Development Committee is now known as the Development Committee (DC). Our mission statement is "To provide opportunities in the sport of Dressage to expand knowledge and increase enjoyment in participation so personal goals may be achieved".

The DC identified the following groups that possibly could do with assistance on how to gain knowledge and have a pathway towards the HPPP if they so wish.

- 1. Junior and Young Rider
- 2. Newcomers
- 3. Adult Development
- 4. Riders not eligible for HPPP including Riders who are working towards the HPPP and combinations competing successfully at a high standard.

NI and SI Camps as in recent years
Online presentations Criteria to be set
NI and SI Camps
Be included in activities of the HPPP
Riders to be invited by selectors

We hope to deliver programs and activities for these groups during the season and work closely together with Penny Pearce and the High Performance Pathway Program.

I would like to thank my committee members and presenters for their input, Georgia for all her admin work and am looking forward to the see where the new approach to develop our Sport will lead us.

6.7 ESNZ HIGH PERFORMANCE

HIGH PERFORMANCE PROGRAMME

Reflecting on the 2022 – 2023 year within the Dressage high performance programme and there is plenty to celebrate, most notably that New Zealand fielded a team (Melissa Galloway – Windermere J'Obei W, Gaylene Lennard – Jax Johnson, John Thompson – Chemistry) at the 2022 FEI Dressage World Championships, the first time since 1998. Unfortunately, we were unsuccessful in obtaining team qualification for the Paris Olympics. We now look forward to individual campaigns for Paris 2024 and focussing on the next World Championships. Without dedicated funding it had been difficult to launch and deliver on a full dressage performance programme and so a commitment was agreed between ESNZ/ESNZ Dressage to fund an end-to-end performance pathway. This funding enabled the appointment of a dedicated HP Dressage Manager, Penny Pearce, in January 2023. Penny quickly got to work and redesigned the dressage performance pathway for all squads and completed a selection review in February 2023.

Since her appointment Penny has been busy building relationships to ensure processes and strategies are aligned and this included meeting with all High-Performance squad athletes, ESNZ Dressage Judges committee members and Dressage selectors to ensure they all understand the vision and goals of the new pathway. Eliza Johns, previous Eventing Sport Manager for 11 years, was appointed to the High-Performance Central team in the role of operations in February 2023. Eliza works within the HP Central Team across all disciplines and supports both the dressage and jumping HP Managers with administration and operational functions. Isobel Wessels visited NZ again in March and spent time with both the Dressage and Eventing squads. This visit was made possible via funding obtained through the Prime Ministers Scholarship Scheme. Isobel spent time at

the Dressage Nationals and was then able to debrief with the High-Performance Futures squad members going over their tests and areas to focus on and improve. During her visit, Isobel also facilitated coaching clinics for both Eventing and Dressage which were well attended.

In April, Penny accompanied Melissa Galloway (HPF), Wendi Williamson (HPF) and Madison Schollum (TD) on a very successful trip to the Sydney CDI. The results at this event from all three combinations were remarkable, in particular to have Melissa and Wendi quinella all three performances in the Grand Prix, Grand Prix Special and the Freestyle to music.

The programme was able to deliver the very first "Off Horse" camp which was held in May in Hawkes Bay with the other NZ HP Pathway disciplines and was well received. The annual off horse camp has been delivered by Eventing for the past four years and continues to develop its purpose and content to grow athlete knowledge, build relationships and strengthen the whole team.

LOOKING FORWARD

The forward momentum made in the HP Dressage space in the last 12 months remains with high performance athletes continuing to campaign for individual quota spots in Paris next year. The national High-Performance programme is taking shape quickly with individual performance plans being completed with each athlete and squad trainings confirmed with Brett Parbery over June and September.

These are aligned to the template being used for both Eventing and Show Jumping. The Dressage High Performance Squads are managed by Penny Pearce who brings exciting ideas and direction to this small elite group of horses and riders. I am sure you will be hearing more from Penny about her role in the future.

As a result of this new initiative, the National Selectors team of myself, Barbara Chalmers and Karen Anderson now have a changed role. We will be tasked with selecting teams to represent within NZ and maybe abroad i.e. Australian State Challenges to which we may receive invites. Where in the past DNZ has tried to offer training in various forms to the National Squads, the High Performance riders will have specific focused training with a view to the horses and riders representing NZ at the World Games and Olympics. The exception to this is the Talent ID Squad who are young riders regarded to show exceptional promise for producing team combinations for the future.

The National focus will now be on Area Groups delivering training and camps to their active members. The newly named Development Committee (formerly Performance Committee) is also working to provide training and development camps for riders in each Island and guidance for coaches with developing combinations to achieve their goals. This Winter will be the first trial run and while we hope it will be successful, it will no doubt need some fine tuning. This is aimed to reach passionate riders and encourage development of their skills. Hopefully in this way our Grass-roots riders will gain benefit from the training initiatives offered to them. Feed-back is encouraged to be forwarded to help make these camps fulfil the needs of riders and participants.

I look forward to seeing you all competing in the new season. It is to be hoped that with the worst of the Pandemic, a horrendously wet competitive season and unprecedented "wild weather" behind us resulting in so many cancellations, we can look forward to a more settled season ahead. My best wishes to you all, your horses and competitors and I hope you are able to make strides towards achieving your personal goals through the new season of competition.

2022/23 year of being SI Rider Rep has certainly seen a turning point in Dressage NZ. To see fellow Marlborough as well as South Island Rider Melissa Galloway passage her way into the WEG certainly was one memory most of Dressage NZ riders won't forget in a hurry.

Events in the South Island saw an increase in riders in the levels 5 & 6, with a few more coming out at GP. The lower levels are dropping away slightly, especially at Prelim levels but the upward trend in Bronze and ungraded is positive. Some SI riders have stepped up in their judging levels or have entered their first year at judging – which in itself is positive for the sport. The Crawford Hill Jewellers South Island Champs was for the second year ran as a SI collective with each area participating in the running of the event – which was held in very hot conditions, but very successfully. The riders meeting held at SIDC was well attended, and some positive steps and feedback came out of this including the need and reasoning why to keep the Bronze/Silver/Gold Categories.

Overall, the majority of connecting with riders to gain feedback for remits, topic discussion or sharing DNZ news is done via FB. This is becoming a highly valuable tool in gauging riders' views and allowing them a platform to voice their opinions.

The SI Dressage rider's community held an online fundraising auction after the devastating Cyclone Gabrielle raising nearly \$8k towards the ESNZ Cyclone relief fund. This was an excellent way for SI riders to feel that they were helping as they felt helpless being so far away and not being able to be hands on.

Once again, I feel like this year has been highly successful and looking forward to representing SI Riders again in the 2023/24 season if re-elected.



6:12 North Island Rider Representative

Main issues that have come up throughout the year

1) Discussion around Gold/ Silver/ Bronze system

General feedback (quotes from riders in the Facebook group):

- Poll in FB group- 25% leave G/S/B, 70% return to open/ amateur system
- Because a few people are very anti being called an amateur, could call it open/ restricted or have prelim and open prelim (name accordingly to level)
- Think GSB can work with a few tweaks. It has been a strange couple of years since it was introduced, so we haven't really had a chance to see it work as intended. But I think riders should be allowed to "opt up". Anyone who has ridden senior FEI probably should only drop to silver not bronze after the 4 years (or whatever length of time). This would keep bronze for people who are really just getting to grips with it all. From an OC perspective, GSB has made it really difficult to award prize money, and it costs more to get extra ribbons & sashes. There is always some confusion, and a few headaches caused by having the divisions. We do need to be careful when adding more complexity as it can be overwhelming.
- Given the small rider pool in NZ, the simpler the better. Each level could be split into Restricted (or some other acceptable name) and Open. Riders can opt to ride in Open if they wish. The third time you get x% or higher at a level, you move to Open for that level. You can ride in Restricted again if you don't get x% in that level for [some number of] years (e.g. riders who end up with chronic conditions, returning adults, etc). Sure, for a period of time some advanced riders can technically ride in Restricted, but most will do the decent thing and opt to ride in Open, or they'll likely qualify themselves out in one or two shows anyway
- The issue I had with the old system was that I was classed in a higher category because of what I had done years ago. I've had a few injuries and other "life" things happen since then and certainly don't ride as well as I used to, so the G/S/B was fabulous for me as it meant when I came to getting out with my young horse we were riding against people of equal level to where we were both at, and he wasn't being penalised for something I'd done years ago!! I don't have an issue with the term "Amateur" ... the issue I have is people who I would class as "Professional" i.e. they make a living off the sport, being able to ride in amateur classes
- If you have ridden at dressage FEI level you should only be allowed to be gold at all levels.
- Don't think we're big enough to have all these divisions G/S/B and CM this and CM that If you really feel you need the different labels have Prelim and Open Prelim, Novice, and Open Novice. Maybe work it on points gained in certain grades for championship shows i.e. in Prelim & Novice if you've achieved more than 3 scores on a particular horse over 65% and/or 25 pts in that grade from May to May or more than 100 points in total on any horse/s in all grades you are Open. SO have a Prelim and Open class but only IF entries warrant it. You can put in the rules if any Level has less than 10 (or whatever number) entries, they will be combined. Needs a lot of fine tuning but something to toss around. This would get rid of the pot hunters. Those with no ambition to go any higher than Prelim/Novice could be catered for competing at local tournaments. By the time you're Elementary level you should be able to compete on a level playing field step up to the mark peeps make your idols become your rivals
- Seems quite complicated and who is going to keep all these points? I do heartily agree there are way
 too many divisions which is costly and complicated for OC's. Becomes participation not competition.
 Prize giving for over 40 champions is OTT in my humble opinion.

- Honestly, I think G/S/B is too expensive and complicated. More expense through ribbons and rosettes and it decreases prize money which isn't huge anyway. Technically unless you are riding for a living you aren't a professional anyway so there would be few riders in NZ who come under that label. I remember back when the Olympics was for amateur riders and not open to professional riders. There is nothing wrong with Open/amateur. Maybe in other countries with many more riders the G/S/B might work better but I think the open/amateur is perfect for NZ. It's simple, easy to understand and gives less experienced riders a chance to compete and get a placing and it also gives them something to aspire to.
- The big issue with G/S/B is riders who have competed high levels (Advanced up) being able to ride in bronze and even silver at low levels, they should be immediately put into Gold because it is still impacting the even playing field more than before
- The purpose as I understand of this system was to remove the "amateur" rider categories which was based on the level a rider had EVER competed at to use the system based in the UK. This new system is burdensome for organisers and confusing for competitors in my opinion. Riders have to move up the divisions as they are successful based on percentages earned. They end up not "amateurs" competing against their peers but open riders who may have competed at international level, thus removing the purpose that the old system based on rider levels had. Having 3 divisions at events has shown our country is not able to support this with many shows having to combine Gold and Silver or so few in a division that riders are becoming winners with low scores. This makes the competitions more participation, increases cost to OC's, increases the workload on OC's, EE not putting riders in correct categories, confusion at prize givings and increased times of prize givings, and riders never sure what they have won or placed in. With many shows using different judges for the different categories this makes this not a true level playing field.
- If we want to increase participation and reward our "amateur" riders, then the previous system based on rider categories is a system that worked. Riders had a choice if they wanted to compete in the open category for titles or "amateur" and compete against their peers with no pressure to move up to open.
- All should be judged by the same judges so riders can see how they truly compare overall. No time limit on a rider category or when a rider moves from ponies to horses.
- My suggestion to run classes is as follows; Preliminary-CN to C2, Novice-CN to C3, Elementary-CN to C4, Medium-CN to C5, Advanced Medium-CN to C6, Advanced-CN to C7, Pro Am for the FEI levels-first season at small, middle, or big tour
- Shows could offer at any level a prize for 1st time at a level
- AMDG at our local events in previous years gave a rug to a CN rider who won the CN class run at
 Preliminary level. They could only win this once. New riders to dressage loved the opportunity to win
 a rug! This could even be made open to riders of your groups to increase membership.
- Whether you call it "amateur" (for the love of it) or Restricted or Silver and Gold we need to look at how to improve this system to make it encouraging for riders, easier for OC's and cost effective. Whatever system we use areas need to have the autonomy to run events how they see fit to encourage their riders to attend and keep numbers up. When all is said and done for these big events to survive (especially with their big costs) that they get as many entries as possible. National events must follow a clear, easy format that is fair for every rider who chooses to enter.
- 2) HOY qualifications especially level 1/ prelim- why is it necessary to qualify at a Premier League show? Makes sense for novice and up because they do musicals to qualify, but for our prelim riders shouldn't a qualifying score from a registered show be sufficient? With the recent increase in entry fees to be it is placing another financial barrier in the way of people achieving their dreams. Additionally, could non premier league shows run freestyles to qualify for HOY, they don't need to be included in Zilco leader boards necessarily but how good would it be to have a local/ regional show dedicated to freestyles to make that more accessible too?

- 3) Young Dressage Horse classes- are they working? How can they be improved?

 This is a work in progress, but they are worth keeping on, the committee are still looking for ways that they can make it more popular
- 4) Rider help at shows- it is really important riders volunteer help where they can at shows- poo picking and writing etc, this helps contribute to keeping costs down too if shows aren't having to pay everyone for everything. Noted attendees of the meeting are generally people who help but people do need to be more aware, especially poo picking, lots of people stand around watching so it isn't hard to pick up poo as it comes, if everyone did that then there wouldn't need to be a roster.

Any Further General Business from the riders meeting

- Betty Brown putting in remit: fly masks in warm up
- Discussion about neck straps, generally agreed that if someone feels strongly enough about this then they should put in a remit.
- Arena famil- continue to struggle to get arena familiarization, been a battle going on and on, the
 assumption is walk only which isn't accurate. Understand organising committees have their own
 factors about how they can run it. Have tried explaining to OC that walk/ trot/ canter in the area is
 hugely valuable thing to do. Happens overseas but huge resistance here. We all really want it and will
 keep pushing for it. It is okay if it is the day before, doesn't have to be every morning. More
 awareness for riders to know that the rules don't state that it has to be in walk
- Development committee has just put forward that there are rider reps at every show who can feed back to TDs any issues, we hope it will be constructive thing to be

Majority of riders are FOR the change to allow dark coloured breeches/jodhpurs at shows.

The only other main point of discussion that came up through the year was about changing the levels that we currently have in New Zealand and after having a special meeting with the Judges Sub Committee it was agreed to leave them as they are.





6:13 Taupo Equestrian Centre DNZ Representative

It has been another busy year at the NEC for Dressage. Our discipline directly contributed \$153,791 in fees making it the biggest discipline user.

Wallie Niederer is standing down as Chair of the NEC committee after many years of dedication to **the centre.** A new Bylaw for the governance and administration of the both the Taupo and Christchurch NEC is currently being worked through by ESNZ and when this is completed, a new Chair will be confirmed for Taupo, following the next meeting on 13 July.

The new NEC managers Logan and Karen are doing a great job

Key actions

- NEC roles- more transparency around clarity of roles for NEC staff and sub-committees is being addressed
- Drainage of indoor area and stable roof run off is being investigated
- Booking system remains a challenge but NEC's situation is nothing new there are other organisations that face similar challenges. NEC just needs to sort out their rules and requirements prior to requesting supply tenders from Technology Providers. A presentation was put to the Committee by Karen and Logan regarding a commercial booking system software package called RMS Cloud, which Karen has utilised extensively in her former roles with various NZ Camping Grounds. The Committee were impressed with the software, although there were some members that were reluctant for change to occur. Nevertheless, a motion was put forward to trial this software, so change is afoot. But the process will potentially be slow (one step at a time), as people need to become enlightened and feel comfortable with the new processes.
- **Cleanliness of the facility** there was recognition that staffing issues and equipment issues have hampered this, and hopefully these are now resolved (to be seen).
- Judges Boxes one is currently under construction and additional boxes (plus any necessary modifications) will be considered. Features include wheelchair access and front sliding windows for ventilation.
- **Covered yards** additional cover yards continue to be a key discussion point of the committee, but funding is a constraint at the current time.







6:14 Youth Council Annual Report

Meila Picard

Introduction

This report is a summary of the Youth Council initiatives and activities for the 2022/2023 season, as well as a summary of our proposed future initiatives. The Youth Council have rolled out a large number of our plans from the previous season, including webinars, presence at the Dressage NZ Youth Festival, and engaging with the Area Representatives. The Council is very pleased with the progress that has been made this season, and we look forward to developing new and exciting initiatives and increasing our reach within the young rider community.

Mission Statement

Our vision as the DNZ Youth Council is to create a safe community in which young riders are supported and inspired. We are striving to create a space in which every young rider is able to express themselves, support one another and all learn and grow together to benefit both themselves, their peers and their horses or ponies. We want young riders to succeed in every aspect of the sport, and we want to ensure that we do everything we can to help make this happen.

Roles within the Youth Council

Last year Lucarne Dolley, our Chairperson, made the decision to resign from the Youth Council due to her own commitments. In October 2022 a meeting within the Youth Council was held and Meila Picard was appointed Chairperson. With Lucarne's departure, we had a role open and sought applications to fill our final position. We opened applications through our social media platforms and word of mouth and received a very strong set of applicants from across New Zealand. We interviewed candidates and shortlisted two. After significant discussion and an internal vote between our original five members we selected Rilee McMeekin from Nelson to fill our final position. Each of the six members of the council now fill the following positions:

Chairperson: Meila Picard

Deputy Chairperson: Anna Wilson

Secretary: Piper Crake and Rilee McMeekin Treasurer/Finance Manager: Meg Johnston

Social Media and Communications: Alyssa Harrison

Karen Shields stepped down from her role as our mentor in December 2022 and this role has not been filled. We are very grateful for her support, encouragement, and assistance in navigating our roles and responsibilities within the council.

Meetings

The Youth Council has been meeting regularly and taking minutes from these meetings. These provide us with an opportunity to share ideas and make action plans for upcoming events. The Council also met with Wendy Hamerton to discuss initiatives.

Facebook Page

One of our primary means of communication with the young rider community is our private Facebook group 'Dressage NZ Youth Rider Community.' We are using this page to develop a safe space for young riders to connect with one another, promote opportunities and for experts within the equestrian world to share their knowledge. This page is strongly moderated by the Youth Council and to be added to the page you must read the page rules and answer relevant questions. This is to ensure that the page is only used by young riders, or for those that do not have Facebook, their parents.

Our page as of May 2023 has 325 members, an increase of 146 members from this time last year. These members are a range of ages and include NZPCA members.

Further plans are in place to create more engagement with the Facebook page through competitions, giveaways and expert advice being shared through this platform on a regular basis.

Area Representatives

A large number of Areas have appointed a youth representative for their committees, which is an exciting development to ensure youth representation at an area level. The Youth Council have connected with all of the current area reps to provide a platform for sharing ideas and promoting youth initiatives. The council is in the process of setting up monthly meetings for the council and the area representatives, to ensure that information and initiatives are reaching young riders, and that they can provide a platform for feedback to be shared with the youth council.

Youth Gatherings

A number of youth gatherings have been run across the country with the aim of creating more welcoming and social environments at shows and giving young riders the opportunity to come together to make new friends and support one another.

Rilee McMeekin has been of invaluable assistance with running these, particularly throughout the South Island. Gatherings were run at Nelson Dressage and Ashburton Premier League last season. The feedback was very positive with people indicating they would love to have informal young rider gatherings more often.

Current work is being undergone to plan where and when youth gatherings will be held next season. The area representatives will also be involved with this process.

Furthermore, Meg and Meila attended the DNZ South Island Development Camp in October 2022 where they held a quiz and brainstorming session for what young riders would like to see improved within the sport. This was an invaluable exercise to run as it enabled us to hear from a youth perspective what our priorities should be. Many commented on creating a more welcoming and inclusive environment with parents particularly being highlighted as the cause of some negativity and hostility within competitive environments. Moreover, a lack of warm-up etiquette was highlighted alongside riders having issues with adults 'dominating' warm-up areas, especially for those riding ponies.

It was a great experience to attend this event and many riders commented that it was enjoyable and helped them to learn more about the Youth Council and the support we can offer.

Webinars

Winter of 2022 saw the start of our Youth Council webinar series, consisting of six Youth Council member webinars, and webinars with some of New Zealand's top dressage riders. We were honoured to host Vanessa Way, Melissa Galloway, and John Thompson for a zoom session each. All three provided some great insights into their experiences, successes, and hardships they had experienced along the way and provided inspiration for the youth riders.

The Youth Council webinar series gave an introduction to competing for those who were new to the sport. The webinar series started from a tutorial for entering shows, and progressed through preparing your horse for a show, riding a test and interpreting test papers, and finished with caring for your horse after a show. We received great feedback from these webinars.

U25 Youth Festival 2023

The terrible weather and flooding made this show challenging but saw the first Youth Council stand at a premier league show. We hosted a variety of competitions, including scavenger hunts around the showgrounds. The stand received plenty of traffic and allowed the council to meet some new young riders. The unfortunate but necessary cancellation of day two meant that the stand could not run for another day, but it was still a successful weekend for the youth council.

The Youth Council put out a survey to gather feedback on what riders did and did not enjoy about the show. We received 10 responses, with a summary as follows:

• When asked about the atmosphere of the show:

40% friendly atmosphere 30% welcoming atmosphere 20% competitive atmosphere 0% hostile atmosphere

- One rider commented on the atmosphere being 'clique-ish' with a general feeling people were out to heat others
- People commented that their highlights from the show were being around their friends, supportive fellow riders, a fun atmosphere, and Libby Law.
- Most people commented that the weather was their only challenge/difficulty whereas one commented that the tone/manner of coaches/parents in the warm-up was unpleasant.
- 70% of people said they enjoy having targeted young rider events during the show while 30% said no preference either way. The most popular young rider 'activity' was a social event where all young riders can come together. The most common reason for people not having a preference is a lack of time at shows, this is common for those competing more than one horse.
- One respondent commented that they feel the young rider activity shouldn't take away from the competitive atmosphere and the purpose of the show.
- The need for better warmup etiquette education was highlighted.

Youth Sport Hui 2023

Meila attended the NZ Youth Sport Hui in March 2023 as a youth representative for the sport on behalf of the Youth Council. This was a fantastic opportunity to learn more about youth initiatives within New Zealand, network and experience this event alongside the ESNZ team. It was very inspirational to see how DNZ and ESNZ have made such a progressive step forward with the introduction of the Youth Council as many other sports are yet to see such youth engagement.

Upcoming Initiatives

The Youth Council has some exciting initiatives that we will look to start in the future. These include:

- Working with the Area representatives to run more youth gatherings at premier league shows.
- Running a Youth Council led event or camp for young riders.
- Starting a scholarship programme for young riders studying at university.
- Creating a 'buddy system' for riders that are new to the sport. This involves pairing up older and more experienced youth riders, with young riders that are new to the sport.

Conclusion

Overall, the Youth Council has received a positive response from our young rider community and their families. Our social media presence has increased, and the addition of a new South Island council member has meant that we have a wider reach across the country. The webinar series was popular and provided inspiration for riders, and our stand at the DNZ Youth Festival allowed us to interact and engage with more young riders.

This season has allowed us to increase our presence and engagement with the young rider community and we look forward to continuing with our exciting initiatives for the upcoming season.

6:15 Bates DNZ National Championships

I was delighted to take on the task of organising the Bates National Championships. This was especially challenging as having not been in NZ for very long there was lots to learn and thanks to Covid it meant that two Championships had to be run in the space of one season. I am particularly grateful to the OC teams, Judges, Stewards and volunteers for their patience and help. I am only going to name one person and that is Wendy, her support and guidance has been wonderful and invaluable. It is all these people who really made the events the success they were. The Championships in November 2022 also included the Livamol World Challenge, while a CDI was also incorporated in March 2023.

SPONSORSHIP

With 2 championships in one season it was quite challenging to have all the classes sponsored for both events, but thanks to the wonderful work by Amanda Condon and Lisa Marcroft this was achieved. David Jones Parry of Bates Saddles was one of the sponsors who supported both events with the March Championships celebrating the 25th Anniversary of this partnership. I would like to say thank you to all the sponsors for the vital support.

FUNDING/BUDGET

Both events received vital external funding. In November \$21,000 was received from the Pub Charity and Air Rescue. In March the main source of the funding was the Aotearoa Gaming Trust and the Lion Foundation, and this totalled \$30,000. With costs increasing across the board, the additional funding is imperative.

The March event saw some unexpected cost increases. In the wake of Cyclone Gabrielle all accommodation proved to be unavailable meaning that accommodation had to be sourced at very short notice and this resulted in an unexpected increase in costs. Accommodation was not up to the standard expected in some cases and these hotels will not be used again.

OPERATIONS/SERVICES

The service providers were the same for both events and did a great job. Catering provided by Sue McKenna, Baked with Love and Good Graze had good feedback.

Hema's Delight, Lil Something Coffee and Juice for Real were onsite for the riders and are all well received.

Your Sound and Lighting continue to provide excellent service.

Live streaming continues to be popular with more and more people tuning in to watch. There were some technical issues getting it started in November, but these did not happen in March.

ORGANISING COMMITTEE

The event in November saw the same team members, apart from myself, return and this certainly contributed to the smooth running of the event.

Two shows in a 6 month period meant that it was understandably difficult for some people to return in such a short space of time. This allowed for some new people to join the team in March and while it was a steep learning curve, all did a fabulous job.

Finding people to collect the sheets was the hardest job, however riders stepped in to fill the rota and their help was greatly appreciated.

My thanks go to all those riders and volunteers who without the show would not be able to run.

SCHEDULE

The schedule of classes remained largely the same for both events, the exception being the addition of the CDI classes and additional young horse classes in March. Riders were happy with the classes offered. The additional classes did create some timetabling issues. Some para classes were moved to the Land Rover 4 Arena and this proved to be unsuitable. The Young Dressage Horse Final took longer than was planned for, and these horses ended up being out for a long time in the evening. This will be reviewed for the future.

ARENAS

The arenas all rode well at both events and provide a good competition surface. The warmup arena on the grit does give some cause for concern, and is not liked by riders, but is all that is available.

VENUE, STABLES AND YARDS

The venue provides all of the facilities that are required to host these events, however some of the facilities do not meet the standards that are expected for shows of this level. There were loose rails and fittings on yards that required repair and the general cleanliness of the venue was poor.

The Internet and mobile phone network are poor at the venue and this creates issues in terms of the OC being able to communicate with riders in a timely manner. We will look at creating a "rider hub" nearer to the stabling area to try and alleviate some of these issues at future events.

TECHNICAL DELEGATE, JUDGES, STEWARDS & WRITERS

At both events the judging went well and no protests were received. There was only one international judge in November but four in March. They enjoyed the shows, and the judging. A highlight of the March event being that Melissa Galloway and Windermere J'Obei W achieved a new New Zealand record for their FEI Grand Prix Freestyle Music with a score of 77%.

Margs Carline and Barbara Chalmers acted as Technical Delegates for both events, with Rachel McCallum and Jane Robertson as Chief Stewards respectively. Any matters were dealt with as they arose in a very professional way.

As with other jobs, it was a little harder to get a full complement of writers for the March event, but again riders stepped in to help where necessary and all classes were covered.

ENTRIES

Entries for November and March were almost identical. November saw a small increase with 141 riders competing compared to 136 in March on 173 horses and 171 horses respectively.

The realisation of the NEC long term plan to make additional stables available could lead to an increase in entry numbers at this event.

HEALTH & SAFETY & MEDICAL

Fully qualified medical professionals were on site for both events. The teams from Air Ambulance Service and Medics On Scene did a great job of looking after everyone and there were no major incidents. The venue horse ambulance was available but was not needed.

CONCLUSION

Both events were successful. There were things that can, and will be, learnt from, however there were no issues that could be considered major problems and no issues proved to be insurmountable. I look forward to 2024!

Referred from Planning Forum: Protocol Days - Re Potential Conflict of Interest for Judges For information: Dressage Australia has recently updated their Conflict Rules as follows 1.8.2 People may not officiate as a judge of a competition if:

They have any personal, professional or financial relationship, including relationships of family members that could influence or be perceived to influence objectivity, including but not limited to:

- a) a rider in the competition is a family member
- b) they are in a National Elite Squad and are asked to judge a fellow member of the same squad in a Grand Prix competition
- c) they have given or ridden in a riding clinic within 2 weeks prior to the event and a rider, coach or horse who has participated in that clinic will be in the competition
- d) **they are providing or receiving private billeted accommodation from/to a competitor scheduled to be in the competition they are judging
- e) they are an owner or part owner of a horse taking part in that competition
- f) they have given or received regular training/coaching from/to a horse and/or rider taking part in the competition within 8 weeks prior to the competition
- g) they have a financial interest in a horse in the competition
- h) they are an employee or employer of a competitor in the competition
- i) when accepting judging invitations, a judge must declare a conflict of interest in any person or horse who has entered if, within 12 months immediately preceding the event, they have:
 - owned/part owned or had any other business interest in that horse and/or rider
- j) Judge Educators/Mentors must also follow these principles when carrying out shadow judging/sit-in
- k) they have judged assessed riders at a protocol session within two weeks of the competition

Remit 1: Breeches

RATIONALE: Horses at higher levels can still be nervous. A neck strap would be a safety measure for riders who choose to ride with it.

7B: REMIT:

New wording: Neck straps are approved as a safety device for all levels in Nationals classes. A neck strap is a single plain strap fitted in one loop around the horse's neck, can only be used for safety purposes, cannot be used to stabilise the rider.

RATIONALE: Horses of any level can have moments of resistance or spooking, and easier for judges, riders, officials to remember if it's allowed at all levels.

The GSB subcommittee have factored into their decision from feedback from riders, OC, and judges.

Silver category, given that the gap between Bronze and Gold deemed too wide and by upping the Bronze % to become a bronze/silver category you were losing the essence of the reasoning behind GSB Categories by combing B/S.

- * Upped Bronze to 64% for all Bronze levels.
- A) reduced confusion for riders as they moved up the grades.
- B) 63% was deemed too low, as a DNZ collective we are trying to raise the bar of Dressage across the board. Reflecting on Bronze scores across the country the ones that were participating on average well was sitting on the 64%, this was felt as attainable for Bronze as a whole.
- * Dropping the 'previously ridden levels' down a level in Bronze and Silver this change made those levels true newcomer levels.
- * Dropping the total scores to 10 or more 11 seemed to be confusing, 12 seems too many.
- * Raising the bar four years to eight years in sliver eliminates those riders that have ridden high level within this period. This was a very negative area for riders, as it allowed previously top level riders to be silver.

Gold to become an open level - those riders that wish not to ride in Bronze or Silver are eligible for Gold (Open). Riders can choose to ride out of Bronze/silver at an event where they are offered. They must enter this by close of enter, OC has the right to refuse them change after (pot hunters)

12. GOLD/SILVER/BRONZE REVIEW

Silver to be 67% over all levels in silver.

A) reduced confusion for riders as they moved up the grades. B) it was felt that if a rider is consistently scoring 68% or higher at Silver they were ready to compete in Gold.

Directives for OC:

- * Strongly suggested that areas are to run GSB as merged classes and results extracted. Data from records across NZ highlight that areas or National events do not have more than 30 (sometimes even 20) horses in each level. They can be run as merged classes (whether its bronze and open, or all GSB) GSB results are extracted at end whether for Champion/Reserve or rosettes in individual classes. Areas are to stipulate on schedule and programme how it is to be presented.
- * It was felt that riders have access to a simple table so they can record their own scores (like the old ESNZ Horse rego booklets), that way they can be accountable themselves for what they enter and don't rely on EE or the event management

Sarah Hazlewood FO) presented the Dressage New Zealand condensed statement (unaudited) of financial position for the full year to May 2022, noting despite Covid forcing show cancellations particularly in the Auckland and Waikato areas, income from T & D Levies were not extraordinarily affected.

The cancellation of the National Champs, South Island YR Camp and less than anticipated registrations for the NI Camp attributed to the majority of the variance to budget of income from entry fees and clinic registrations.

The hugely successful Dressage for Denmark Show held in March attributed to the majority of unbudgeted spend, but with reduced expenditure in other cost departments results in an overall surplus of 9k.

Discussion

- Currently unaudited; audited report will be available at the AGA later in the year.
- Lynda Clarke congratulations on sponsorship bumped up by Dressage for Denmark,
- Betty Brown asked to see a financial report on Dressage for Denmark; The FO confirmed a cost of \$17,000, anticipated cost was \$20,000; Sponsorship for D4D was just under \$14,000
- Coaching Specialist budget South Island Camps/Clinics didn't go ahead; there were hopes to have an international specialist in attendance which didn't happen.
- Costs of CDI's has an impact, especially with the costs of international travel rising. Nationals in November will not be a CDI as it is not in a qualification period.

Margs noted the inspirational performances of Melissa Galloway in Europe and John Thompson and Gaylene Lennard in Australia and the National Squads of training opportunities put together for them by Christine Weal. Sadly, and for a variety of reasons (many around Covid) several squad members have had little competition this season. There has also been a high attrition rate of squad horses leaving few combinations still actively competing. Thanked fellow selectors for their support. Noted DNZ has advertised for expressions of interest for inclusion onto the various squads.

Discussion:

Noted the 74% score for High Performance squad eligibility is based on the international stage, not what is the best in NZ, i.e., podium finishes or contribute to a team podium finish, that's the international benchmark, and this is what government funding from High Performance Sports NZ is based on.

It was noted some applicants didn't meet the criteria of the performance squads as they were at the lower levels. Is there a gap here to encourage these riders to develop to the higher level? It was agreed there possibly is, however there is currently no further funding available, and often the transition from novice to medium can be too much for some horses. This is a gap that could be filled by the performance and development pathway, and training at regional level.

9. GENERAL BUSINESS

CEO & ESNZ High Performance Presentation

Julian Bowden and J Paget (in attendance via Zoom)

CEO Update

Considered it is an exciting time for Dressage, it is currently sitting as the equestrian discipline with the most potential.

The last year has been a year of just getting through, as covid had a big impact on the ability to run events. There were opportunities for all disciplines to come together online and share ideas which was positive. Many members didn't register due to the impact of covid.

Board strategy work was completed in December, not widely distributed.

New database launched; the results part has been slow to launch. 27 years of data from 6 different platforms that has been merged, so errors are to be expected.

A couple of new roles created - membership services, and manager of community participation.

Continue to develop relationship with Sport NZ, received funding to support ESNZ through covid, and create a participant survey.

Financially, the ESNZ Board has committed to investing in the NECs.

Sponsorship deal with Land Rover, focusing on development across all disciplines.

Focus on getting Dressage on the world stage and in the spotlight and bring it to the attention of High-Performance Sport NZ, with the aim for funding to be allocated

Social License to Operate – equestrian sport is under the spotlight. How well does the rest of the public view as the sport being acceptable and that the horses are well maintained and looked after. The FEI has taken the lead on this work.

Strategy – Pony to Podium. Collaborating with all organisations providing equestrian experiences. Equestrian sports into the schools winter sports calendar for 2022, will use this as an opportunity to get feedback from the young riders on what they think about the sport.

Measures to track outcomes, research will help set a baseline.

Jock Paget - High Performance overview.

High performance strategy is now a whole sport strategy meaning all 3 disciplines are utilising one HP system and leveraging the efficiencies this creates. The overarching purpose of the strategy is to succeed at the Olympic Games.

HP Olympic criteria is based on the NZ Olympic committee's selection criteria of the combination being capable of a top 16 performance.

Hope for the future is for the Dressage HP programme to be fully funded through external funders so the athletes can focus solely on performance.

Acknowledgement of the Dressage Board and Sports Manager, especially for providing a Dressage for Denmark, a CDI 3* competition in New Zealand to assist with qualifications for Herning.

Qualifications for Paris discussed – different requirements for team and individual riders, these are set by the NZ Olympic Committee. These requirements do not currently appear to be assisting in the development of the sport.

Remit 1 Re: DRESS | Jackets & Tailcoats

CURRENT RULE / ARTICLE NUMBER: 479

Amendment

Add: Tailcoats are permitted at levels Advanced to Grand Prix.

Remit 2: Re Outside Assistance Around Arena

Remit: Art 451.2.5 Unauthorised / Outside Assistance

If necessary, a horse may be assisted in the area directly around the arena by a single handler on foot who may not have physical contact with the horse or the equipment, but once the Judge's bell has been sounded any further assistance will be considered unauthorised / outside assistance.

An associated Rule 451 1.17 was noted:

Resistance:

Any resistance which prevents the continuation of the test longer than 20 seconds will result in elimination. However, resistance that may endanger the athlete, horse, officials, or the public will result in elimination for safety reasons earlier than within 20 seconds.

This also applies to any resistance before entering the dressage arena or when leaving the arena

DISCUSSION

- What about coaches who can control the horse without touching it?
- Betty Brown likes 'at the judge's discretion'
- Leonie Coker all judges are different then unfair and puts a lot of pressure on the judges. Has to be clear cut rule
- Anna Gale what about at OC discretion?
- Sue Hobson from riders and judges fair play this has to be a very clean-cut rule
- Linda Warren-Davey suggested include 'only at a training level only'
- The DSM noted there is a rule which allows for starting within the arena. Could be a role for a riders rep at every event to be a liaison between riders and OC if there are concerns about arena placement
- Margs Carline judge has their discretion to help the combination if the horse is negatively impacted by an outside influence

12. CALLING IT OUT

1. Overview of Current ESNZ Complaints Procedure

Preamble: The 2022 Planning Meeting considered the formality and cost of the current complaints procedure is not conducive to calling out behaviours which either are currently, or can escalate to harassment and bullying. Complainants do not always feel supported and will back away for fear of further behaviours or in some cases perceived to detrimental to their own future in the sport as an athlete or official. What is the answer ??? Despite a variety of ESNZ policies and programmes including Change the Rein, Member Protection, social media policy, Athlete & Officials Code of Conduct, and Conflicts of Interest, there is evidence that to vary from these policies goes unchecked for a number of reasons

2. PRESENTATION & PANEL DISCUSSION

Dressage NZ welcomed Todd Astle from Innerspin to begin the discussion about the effects that inappropriate comments and communications can have on any participant in our sport – how the love of the game can be affected.....

PANEL DISCUSSION - NEXT STEPS with Todd Astle, Julian Bowden (CEO), Scott McKenna (Dressage Chair) Olivia Ballantyne (Board Performance & Development & HR Advisor People & Performance for Mercury Energy), Anna Gale (SI Riders Rep)

Todd Astle presented a very powerful video focusing on the harmful influence of social media, and also talked about the emotional pressures on athletes

Anna Gale – SI Riders Rep provided a comprehensive summary of this session:

Calling out bad behaviour in our sport. Whether it is unintentional 'talking about someone' at a scoreboard, bullying of not only riders - but judges, stewards and OC and harassment. These can come in many formats - in-person, online via social media either public or private message.

Much of this behaviour also prevents riders, judges, support persons calling out bad behaviour towards one another or towards horses in fear of further behaviour or in some cases perceived to detrimental to their own future in the sport as an athlete or official.

We all have to change our mindset, and ask a few questions of either one another or of ourselves to why we do this? We are all in a sport we love, we are all passionate of the sport and why we do it.

We have to think:

If there is no riders/horses - there are no shows

If there are no organising committee - there is no show

If there is no judges - there is no show

If there is no stewards - there is no show.

If we cannot respect one another and either break the cycle of bad behaviour or play nicely we are just in the naughty corner of no show. Playing in our own arenas, in our own lockdowns.

On the whole, areas are struggling for numbers whether its volunteers, judges, stewards and even riders. Registrations are down, volunteers are down and some might say its rising fuel costs, and rising costs of everything - but some stage it's the culture of our sport.

It's easy to shrug your shoulders and say, 'that's not me', or putting it down to 'being honest', or I just 'speak the truth'. You may perceive it as the truth, but what you may think is truthful is not to others - whether they are riders, judges, or OC. Without others there would be no sport.

Ask yourselves - why do I do dressage. Each and every person has their own path - some may want to go to the Olympics, some do it to spend time away from their kids, others just want to progress their own training on their own path and for some its spending time with their horses..... everyone is different. Let's encourage this - it is not your business to talk about 'so and so', how bad their test was and how could they ride like that.

What is the answer.

ESNZ has many policies and programmes on their website, including Change the Rein, member protection, a social media policy, Athlete and Official Code of Conduct and Conflicts of Interest and there is evidence that to vary from these policies goes unchecked for a number of reasons.

One thing is we need to change our culture of our sport — it's not about sitting around at the end of the day and holding hands singing "kumbaya". It's as simple as saying well done to the person in the ring before you, or good luck to the person after. It's about seeing that person in the warmup with a pig of a horse and riding over and saying 'well done for staying on and a pat on the back' as in five minutes she is going to go in the ring. It's about taking five minutes when you write that Facebook post blaming the judges for your poor marks and taking a deep breath, walk away do something and come back and reread it — even delete it and remember that its horses and shit happens. Congratulate that rider that has been lucky enough to obtain a schoolmaster — schoolmasters aren't easy and you actually have to ride a live animal and get it to perform! Humans have 60,000 thoughts a day, and 77% of them are negative. Use the other 23% at horse shows, that is one way to break the cycle... changing the mindset — encourage one another — pat one another on the back—thank your stewards, judges, OC and other riders as without them the dressage world would be a different place.

Also - remember people talk. You might think that the moan at the truck may not go any further than the group you are with, BUT that 77% negative in someone's brain does take it further. They take it and tell another rider, they take it and tell someone that is friends with the OC, they take it and tell someone who is the judge and they screen shot.... Whether a screen shot of a post, a screen shot of a private message or text.... human nature takes over.... That old childhood game of Chinese whispers.

Look after the grass roots, play nicely and for those senior riders - it starts at the top and filters down. Remember that when you leave a ring and if you have had a bad ride - there will be someone watching who will think that your ride was magic - regardless to what you felt/thought and will be inspired watching a senior rider. Kids, remember that parents drive you and spend a fortune on you and they say what you perceive as a 'dumb' comment - just smile, count to 10 and don't bite back. If you see someone arrive, look lost - go and introduce yourself and maybe take them over to meet your delegate, your president or your rider rep. Everyone starts somewhere, and we need to foster those people in our sport and encourage them to stay on by our behaviour.

Calling it out.

We had a presentation by Todd Astle about the negative effects that inappropriate comments, actions and communications can have on any participant in our sport and how the love of the game can be affected.

He shared this simple video with us https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=vmQ8nM7b6XQ, and now I am sharing it with Riders....

Also, thanks to our DNZ Chair Scott McKenna we now have a 'Barry' in dressage, not a 'Karen' - a 'Barry' - let's call Barry out and bring the enjoyment back into Dressage for everyone.

13. Rules Review Concepts

Progress Overview with Suzanne Inglis – Technical Officer

About a year ago, the process of a rules review was started. This started with about 10 people on the review working group, now Suzanne Inglis is the third technical officer, with 4 others involved in the rules review. The group has looked at other formats from other countries, compared our rules to FEI, and concluded that our rules overall were fine, but needed to be in a more logical flow, and just needed a good tidy up.

Have better layout with more logical flow
Tidy up duplicate rules
Fix some contradictory rules
Fix grammar and typos
Goal, to get more people to pick it up and use it!
